FEATURED CAT Michael

This handsome gent was left behind in Clackamas County when his people lost their home. Michael and the other cats in the family were left to scavenge a living from garbage cans and occasional handouts, until a kind neighbor started feeding them regularly. One by one the cats were captured and placed in new homes after vet care was provided.

Michael seemed a little worse for wear—even more than the others; he was a raggedy mess and had something wrong with his eyes, but wouldn't allow anyone to touch him to get a closer look. Eventually he, too, was trapped, and Michael's foster mom soon discovered a loving lap cat starving for affection under the alley cat exterior.

The vet determined that Michael is about 10 years old and had some very painful conditions. The problem with his eyes was entropion, a painful condition where the eyelid rolls inward, causing eyelashes to continually rub against the eyeball. Not only is it painful, it causes weepy eyes and obscured vision. Michael also had some infected and abscessed teeth that needed extraction, and his coat was such a mess that a lion shave was the only way to get him properly cleaned up.

We set about making Michael feel better. After his neuter surgery, we took care of his dental issues, and then he had a third surgery to correct the entropion. Imagine being able to eat without pain and see the world clearly for the first time in many years! His confidence grew, and he seems to be entering a second kittenhood despite his age and battle scars from a rough life. Look at the ear floofs! And the whiskers!

Michael adores being with his people and will run to greet them at the door. He wants a forever family who will introduce him to their friends, play



cool games, and enjoy getting special "Michael kisses" in return. We don't know his history with dogs, but we think he would enjoy the company of another easygoing feline.

Sweet senior Ellen was first seen in desperate straits: she was one of more than 80 dogs discovered in a hoarder situation in California.

Because public shelters in that area are always overflowing with stray and unwanted animals, local volunteers joined forces to rescue dogs from this situation and move them directly to safety, bypassing the high-kill shelter system. My Way Home Dog Rescue committed to providing a safe home and necessary vet care for Ellen, so she began her journey to Oregon.

Ellen arrived safely and found her place among the other oldsters in her foster home. She was a bit overwhelmed by having unlimited food and a safe place to rest for the first time in her life, and she was very polite and careful not to cause any bother. But she was carrying a little secret: her vet exam revealed that Ellen was pregnant with four pups, at the age of 11 years! Sadly, one of the pups did not survive, but the other three thrived and are living happily ever after in their forever homes.

Now it's time for Ellen to find the family who will make her golden years the best ever. She prefers being around calm and quiet adults, or older kids who will respect her needs. She gets along fine with other dogs, but has not been tested with cats.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

We're fortunate to have good resources in our area for companion animals, including low-cost spay and neuter services, shelters, and rescue groups. But there are many situations that fall outside the mission of those organizations and that's where ARCF comes in to help.

We often work with other organizations to resolve difficult situations, as we did when we were connected with residents of a big apartment complex in Clackamas County who needed help with abandoned cats living around their buildings, including at least five litters of kittens born recently. The Feral Cat Coalition of Oregon (FCCO) provides spay/neuter services at their donation-based clinic, but they don't have resources for organizing TNR (trap-neuter-return) projects and transporting cats to the clinic.

Our volunteers met with the property manager to explain the program and obtain approval to come onto the property and trap the cats. Then we canvassed the complex, hanging a flyer on each door and talking to tenants to determine the number of cats we would be handling and where they were being fed. We made appointments at FCCO, set trapping dates, and a couple weeks later all the kittens (including **Gertie** and the rest of the "G" litter) were in our foster homes going through "boot camp" to get them ready for adoption. More than a dozen adult cats were returned to the property after their surgeries, where their caregivers will continue to provide food, water, and shelter for the remainder of each cat's life.

Another call came from a man whose wife had died, and even after several months her beloved cat remained hunkered under her bed, coming out only at night to eat and use the litter box. No one in the family was able to touch the cat, and they just wanted him gone. No organization would come to help catch and care for him, so our volunteer went to assess the situation and within a few days **Shadow** was trapped and on his way to our vet. He is a sweet boy, about 10 years old, but

obviously traumatized by his experience. After his immediate needs were attended to, we found a soft landing for him with our friend Mary Dowless, where he will be allowed to adjust to his new family at his own pace.

In another part of town, a senior gentleman passed away, leaving a young momcat, her two kittens, and a very old male

cat to fend for themselves. The gentleman's only remaining family lives abroad, so kind neighbors stepped in to provide food and water for the cats for several months until a probate attorney was retained by the family to settle the estate. The attorney realized the cats needed a more permanent solution, and through a series of connections, she found ARCF. Our volunteer set up a trapping schedule and within a week all were safely off the street.

Momcat was not well socialized, so we helped her find safe placement as a barn cat. The kittens were placed with an adopter who was prepared to invest the time and patience necessary to socialize them to living indoors with people. **Grandpa** cat was a different story; he is a sweet old gent who doesn't really have the street smarts to take care of himself very well. He has only four teeth, some digestive issues, and other conditions common to elderly felines, but he's cleaned up well and is going to make some lucky person a devoted and easygoing companion.

Sometimes the best service we can offer is to connect the right resources and let them finish the job. We received a call from a resident of an RV park about an abandoned cat with seven kittens, roaming the park for handouts. With no local resources available and our foster homes full, we reached out to our friends at The Pixie Project, who would have a foster home available in a couple days. Our friend Tracee was ready and willing to

fulfill transportation needs and the cats were quickly settled in temporary custody with us. Just a few days later the momma cat and her **Gang of 7** were off to The Pixie Project and their new life.

Most kittens born outdoors have issues that require multiple vet visits, in addition to the high quality food and supplements we provide. The older cats we rescue often suffer from "deferred maintenance"—the costs of dental care, lab tests, and other diagnostic procedures add up quickly, in addition to the routine vaccinations and spay/neuter surgery each one receives prior to adoption.

We are so grateful to our generous donors, who allow us to take on these projects and help the animals who have no one else. Every success story we share with you is made possible by our kind and compassionate supporters.

Punkin Kitty Podkowa

One rainy day in 2001, a bedraggled long-haired orange tabby came walking down the driveway of my mother's home in the hills of Woodland, Washington. She had seen him before and knew he did not belong to any neighbors, so she started feeding him. I explained the responsibilities in the state of Washington when feeding stray animals. She understood; we both had stray senior kitties with health issues in the greater Los Angeles area when we lived there.

My mother made an appointment to have **Punkin** neutered. Two days prior to the appointment he disappeared, leaving a trail of blood on her porch. We spent the next four days searching for him. Temperatures were plummeting, it was raining, and we knew he was injured and bleeding, an attraction coyotes and raccoons probably could not resist. On the fourth day, Punkin gathered the strength to make it back to his protected hutch on her porch where she discovered his injured front leg. She scooped him up and they were off to North Portland Veterinary Hospital for medical attention.

Following an x-ray, Dr. Shanks determined that Punkin's right front leg had been shot with a pellet gun. Dr. Shanks felt the best option was to amputate the leg and contacted ARCF for funding assistance. Punkin came through the surgery beautifully and was neutered at the same time. My kitty of 17 years passed away the evening of the day that Punkin came home from the hospital. My mother

lost her 17 year old kitty six weeks later. Neither of us felt ready to open our hearts to another kitty but we knew no one else would understand Punkin's story.

We made a home for Punkin as our "share kitty." My mother's property adjoined mine and I was still working so he spent weekdays with her and had

weekend sleep-overs at my house and we shared financial responsibility.

My mother passed away about six and a half years ago. I brought her home with hospice care. She was with us for seven days and Punkin Kitty stayed with her constantly. He was at her side when she took her last breath. It was such a comfort to have him with her.

He didn't realize when he hooked up with this family that he would have to travel. But he really took to it. He traveled in a motor home all over this country, including Alaska, and Canada. When we were in Virginia for the funeral of my parents at Arlington National Cemetery, I took him to the cemetery to visit their gravesite. I set him down near the grave. He approached and sniffed the flowers and then immediately walked toward the beautiful pin oak tree just behind their grave. He looked up and shot straight up the tree about six feet. Being three-legged, tree climbing was almost impossible. On this day it was like he had helping hands holding him up.

On July 23, 2018, Punkin Kitty passed away peacefully with me in the same home where he kept vigil over my mother six and a half years ago. Punkin was almost 19 years old as best as we could determine. He has been the greatest companion and I will miss my buddy. He enriched my life so and taught me so much. His paw prints will forever be on my heart.

The journey began with ARCF and the support you have given over the years to help animals like Punkin Kitty. I wanted you to know his story and to know how appreciated your work is and to give you satisfaction from a life well lived. Because of your work, this kitty enriched our lives immeasurably. Thank you.
